IT'S BLACK SWAN, WITH MARILYN KELLER, ON NOVEMBER 21

The Black Swan Classic Jazz Band declares itself "Dedicated to the preservation of Dixieland, old-time gospel, early jazz, and ragtime music." The band's name memorializes Black Swan Records, a Blackowned company of the early 1920s. Founded by Harry Pace in Harlem, it was about the first to produce recordings featuring Black artists and intended for an African-American audience.

Kit Johnson, founder of the band, is the self-proclaimed "owner and operator of the tuba." Rick Holzgrafe will be playing cornet. We most recently heard Rick on cornet with the Evergreen Classic band at our November 2018 concert. Steve Matthes, former director of the

OSU concert band, will play clarinet. Don Stone, the trombonist, played here with the band in 2013. Pianist John Bennett earned some of his college tuition playing in a burlesque theater. He claims to be the only pit pianist who never looked up. The drummer will be Ron Leach. He is a lifelong student of percussion who has played in jazz, Latin, blues, and bluegrass bands, as well as symphony and theater orchestras. The banjo with this group of Oregonians will be locally sourced, played by Kevin Johnston.

It took a bit of schedule juggling to ensure that singer Marilyn Keller would be free to appear, but band leaders Kit Johnson and Jonathan Doyle swapped concert dates to make it happen. With Marilyn's rich voice and flawless delivery it's easy to imagine her as one of the vocal stars of the old Black Swan company, along with Alberta Hunter, Trixie Smith, Eva Taylor, and the great Ethel Waters.

A NOTE FROM A PAST PREZ

It has come to my attention that, once again, the Board weeks and could go twice a week. is having difficulty enlisting candidates from the membership to be a member of the Board. I encourage you to take advantage of an opportunity to be on the Board. The quarterly Board meetings are never more than ninety minutes. The reports are brief. The agenda items are presented for discussion, and occasionally a member is assigned to follow up and report back. The PSTJS cannot survive without a dedicated Board. I can assure you that you will retire from the Board with considerable satisfaction that you have done your best to keep the music alive.

PS: I have been a traditional jazz devotee all of my life. My father graduated from the University of Washington in 1930, was a fabulous banjo player, put himself through college with his traditional jazz band, and continued with the band during the Great Depression. They practiced once a week in the living room of our small cottage, and I slept on the other side of the thin wall of our bedroom. I was born in April 1931. It's in my blood. I've had a wonderful life, thanks in large part to the music I have enjoyed. My wife and I go to sleep each night listening to one of our many playlists: traditional jazz, swing, and country.

The September 19th concert was memorable for several reasons. Outside, the weather brought the wettest weekend of the year. During a break between sets, people near the windows were treated to the thrilling view of a sudden squall as it blew in across Puget Sound and inundated the Magnolia enclave on the opposite side of Shilshole Bay. Inside, the music was enthusiastically received. A final tally reported 70 paid attendees (50 members and 20 nonmembers), much better than anticipated by the PSTJS board. The amount still did not cover operating costs, but donations and the payment of membership dues kept us in the black for the month. Unfortunately, bandleader Dave Loomis was unable to attend, due to a death in his family, but Dan Marcus took over Dave's trombone duties and the music never skipped a beat. We offer our deepest condolences to Dave and his family on their loss.
