IT'S JACOB ZIMMERMAN AND HIS PALS ON JUNE 18

Jacob Zimmerman and His Pals bring a novel instrumental lineup to end our spring concert season. Leading the quintet, Jacob will be playing alto sax. Matt Weiner will again play banjo, and Jerome Smith will play tuba. Familiar faces there.

Hans Teuber will be the clarinetist. Although Hans is not yet a regular presence on our bandstand, he has played our two recent Morton-themed gigs. Last June, he enjoyed subbing on short notice for Jonathan Doyle

when Jonathan became ill two days before Andrew Oliver's Jelly Roll Morton concert. In September, he played clarinet in Dave and Mike's Jelly Roll Party, duplicating Omer Simeon's role in the Red Hot Peppers. Since he came here from South Carolina some thirty years ago, Hans has been a top-call reed man. Hopefully, we'll be seeing and hearing more from him in our traditional settings.

Completing the quintet, we'll be hearing Nova Devonie for the first time. Nova plays accordion, an instrument never before heard at a PSTJS event. Since "accordion" seldom, if ever, appears in the same sentence with "jazz," let alone on the same bandstand, this calls for some explanation. Jacob tells us this: "Matt has played with Nova for many years and recently introduced her to me. I only recently played with Nova for the first time. We did a great gig with the almostidentical lineup, playing Jimmie Noone band tunes, in March. I was excited about what Nova added to the music and I wanted to hear more. The same lineup as for the June PSTJS session just played for the Olympia Jazz Society and it was great. Nova is able to fluidly play as part of the rhythm section/back line, as well as play with the reeds in the front line."

Charlotte Dickison was long-time director of the Olympia Jazz Festival and is now president of the Olympia Jazz Society. As that recent Olympia session ended, Charlotte enthusiastically told Jacob, "Let's do it again!" Jacob says, "The Jimmie Noone band is a good frame of reference for how we'll sound. Tunes in the

Remember all of the festivals that used to be presented? We have played at at least five festivals that then closed the doors: Ocean Shores, West Seattle, Ballard, Friday Harbor, and Whidbey Island.

Well, we are by comparison relatively healthy, but the margin is not great. And, as I have previously mentioned, we operate at a deficit each meeting, with enough in the bank to continue for a while. We also have the advantage of having a terrific music director. John Ochs has a great lineup for the coming season and you will be hearing and dancing to some wonderful music.

So be there! Bring a friend. Up your membership to a Lifetime status. Make a donation. Come and volunteer. Listen, dance, or at least tap your feet or sway in place. This music is meant to be enjoyed in any way that moves you.
