BLACK SWAN CLASSIC JAZZ BAND

The mission statement on the band's website declares it is "dedicated to the presentation and performance of Dixieland, old time gospel, early jazz, and ragtime music." The band's name honors Black Swan Records, a pioneering Black-owned company based in Harlem. That company, led by Harry Pace, marketed its classic jazz and blues to a Black audience from 1921 to 1924 until it was absorbed by Paramount Records, which continued to serve that market.

Our November concert marks Black Swan's 13th appearance on our stage. Cornetist Rick Holzgrafe began his music career in southern California playing with Paul Woltz in the Fink

So why does anyone volunteer?

I have been pondering this question for a while, prompted by the rector of the church I attend. The church has a feeding program that provides food for about 150 people every Tuesday evening. With the production and consumption of food comes the harsh reality



of dirty pots, pans, silverware, and dishes...lots of it. So, there I am, every Tuesday between 5 and 7, with a rubber apron and long gloves spraying, washing, loading, and putting dish-holding trays in the sanitizing machine.

I am by no means alone; there are always at least 3–4 more people clearing dishes, doing the silverware, unloading the sanitizer, and putting things away.

My partner at the dish station is also there every Tuesday, and we have developed a coordinated process that requires no words but moves along with anticipated needs and activities. It's actually kind of like a slow dance with its own tempo. Lisa is my wife Karin's long-distance hiking partner, and she happens to be an accomplished classical clarinetist and a skilled ice hockey player. So I usually do what she says.

So, why do we do it? Well, the short answer is because the dishes are dirty and they need to be cleaned. The real reasons why anyone volunteers are more complex, and in many ways they are quite personal. They could be family or parental modeling, peer leadership, wanting to be involved in an activity other than work, and so forth. Similarly, the rewards are quite personal, but there usually is a strong component of satisfaction that donated time and effort provides to the volunteer.

The people behind the smooth running of the Jazz Society and its monthly meetings have been at it for many years. Yes, we like, dance to, and play this music and want to support its continuation for many years to come. There is Gloria, the treasurer and guardian of the front gate; Sharon, who looks over the snack table; Cilla, the board secretary, who

organizes the monthly raffle; Keith, who sets up and takes down the sound system; Carol, who keeps the membership logs up to date; and John, who schedules and assists the bands for our monthly meetings. Other board members—Carolyn, Jim, Bill, and Joanne—are also part of the organization's activities.

Most of the board members noted above have agreed to serve another year and will be on the ballot at our December meeting. And, yay!, we have two new members to the organization who have stepped up and offered to join the board: Gary, a long-time jazz fan and trumpet player who also likes to write, and his partner Heather, who grew up in a family where her father's collection of jazz records played a large part in her musical tastes. So their names will be on the ballot, also.

I think that the October meeting was a really good one, with great music played by very skilled musicians. November and December will be equally enjoyable and I look forward to seeing you all there. And, maybe, even hearing that you would like to volunteer, no?

Street Jazz Band during the 1960s. Prior to moving to Portland in 2013, Rick was a 20-year member of the Mission Gold Jazz Band in San Francisco's Bay Area. Steve Matthes, a charter band member and past director of the OSU Concert and Corvallis Community bands, will play clarinet. Don Stone, co-founder of the Last Chance Jazz Band and principal trombonist for the Helena Symphony Orchestra in Montana, completes the front line.

Ron Leach, who has performed as percussionist in Latin, blues, jazz, bluegrass, symphonic, and theater groups throughout Oregon, will work the drums. Multi-instrumentalist Andy Hall, familiar to us as a regular in the Uptown Lowdown and Hume Street bands, is the pianist for this session. New to the band is banjoist John Kaleta, a longtime member of the Rose City Banjoliers and the Mardi Gras All Stars. On tuba, leader and founding member Kit Johnson fills out the rhythm section.

A major reason for the band's enduring popularity is the presence of vocalist Marilyn Keller, whose puretoned voice and versatile command of song styles grace her every delivery. She draws upon a wide spectrum of music, including early 20th-century blues compositions, gospel standards, and popular tunes from the pens of many of America's great Tin Pan Alley and Broadway songwriters.

These days, out of necessity, many of the groups we hear are just assembled for the gig, as a result of the diminishing pool of musicians who focus primarily on preserving the traditional idiom. Not so with Black Swan. Most of them have been together for years! Marilyn Keller will be making her 12th appearance on our stage. For Ron Leach, Steve Mathes, and Kit Johnson it's appearance number 11, and for Rick Holzgrafe, it will be number seven. As mentioned previously, we know Andy Hall as a sideman with several bands. This will be his fifth session with Black Swan.

Years of playing together make for a tight presentation of the jazz to which the band is dedicated. Their long-time backing of Marilyn Keller adds depth to her outstanding vocal performances. All this should encourage us to join the crowd at the Ballard Elks for the November 19th performance of the Black Swan Classic Jazz Band with Marilyn Keller. Be there! And please, bring a friend or two!
